



Dear Residents,

For my last newsletter to you, I reviewed the goals set by Council in our Strategic Plan. It was our guide and reflected your feedback from the 2014 Election Campaign. We accomplished so much in a short time! I would be remiss if I did not highlight a few of those accomplishments:

CNL

The growing partnership with CNL has strengthened our host municipality relationship, demonstrating benefits to all parties, including:

- Regular meetings with AECL / CNL and Deep River to explore opportunities and understand concerns
- Provision of potable water to the plant site
- Partnership to provide Deep River with full fire suppression service, that includes full service in education, prevention and training for volunteer and full time firefighters.
- Initiated the first steps to implement a Joint Host Municipal Agreement



Police & Fire

Citizens asked us to review emergency services. This meant looking at providing the service in a cost effective way, while ensuring we met our needs for a safe community.

Reviews were done with extensive public input, utilizing our local paper, direct mail, conducting surveys, and receiving delegations. This proved more successful than traditional open houses that were often poorly attended.

Finances

Our first audited review, in 2014, confirmed that we started this term of council in a very tenuous financial situation. Dean Sinclair Chartered Professional Accountants had more than 36 recommendations identifying the risks related to being underfunded and overbudget. Through a number of initiatives, we were able to recover and the next Council will be in a strong financial position going forward.

Our celebrations

In the midst of the challenges before us, everyone was renewed with the dedicated volunteerism of residents who gave us special memories from our 70th Anniversary and Canada's 150th Birthday. Our outdoor Christmas lighting program grows each year and Canada Day continues to be a treasured local celebration.

We are a community rich in opportunity for all. We are poised for growth and investment. To the incoming council, I extend best wishes for success.

My heartfelt thanks go to Staff and the many Volunteers, who have made such a positive contribution, helping this Council in so many ways.

As Mayor, it has been my honour and privilege to serve the people of Deep River.

- 3. The voting period begins on Tuesday October 9th at 8:30AM and ends on Monday October 22nd at 8:00PM.
- 4. Unofficial election results will be announced in the Council Chambers on October 22nd at approximately 8:30PM.
- 5. The 2018 2022 Town of Deep River Municipal Council will be sworn into office on Wednesday December 5th, at the Inaugural Council Meeting.

Important Dates To Remember

The Water and Sewer rates per unit, for each of the 2018 April and October bills are \$303.50 and \$233.50 respectively, for a total of \$1,074.00 per year. The April bill covers the period of January 1 to June 30 and the October bill covers the period of July 1 to December 31.

The bills are sent out at least 3 weeks prior to the due date. Interest on overdue accounts is 1.25% and will be added at the beginning of each month.

Payments may be made at your bank, through on-line banking, telephone banking or at the reception counter at Town Hall. If paying at the reception counter, please note that we ONLY accept cash, cheques or debit. Payments (CHEQUES ONLY) may also be dropped into the night deposit slot located inside the Police - Fire Department door. Payments received through the night deposit slot will not be issued receipts.

If paying through your on-line banking, please note that your bank may require a 6-8 digit account number. Please choose either Deep River Water or Deep River Taxes as the payee, as applicable, and if you have difficulty entering the account number, you will have to insert or remove zeros at the front of your account number to make the required number of digits. Please call the Town Hall if you have any difficulty setting up your payment through your on-line banking.

The Town offers a pre-authorized payment plan for water and sewer, and tax payments. Forms can be picked up at the reception counter at Town Hall or downloaded from the Town website at www.deepriver.ca/departments/finance/. A VOID cheque or a form with your bank information from your bank is required for sign up. The pre-authorized payments are withdrawn from bank accounts on the 15th day of each month.

FIRE DEPARTMENT



"LOOK, LISTEN, LEARN,

Be aware. Fire can happen anywhere."



Fire Prevention Week - October 7-13, 2018 - This year's theme focuses on three fundamental actions people can take to be fire-safe:

LOOK for potential fire hazards around your home. Take action to prevent fire from starting:

- Always stay in the kitchen while cooking. If you must leave, turn off the stove.
- Encourage smokers to smoke outside. Always extinguish cigarettes in large, deep ashtrays that cannot be knocked over.
- Check electrical cords for damage such as fraying or nicks. A damaged cord can expose wires and result in a potential shock or fire hazard.

LISTEN for the smoke alarms in an emergency. Make sure everyone knows the sound of the smoke alarms and can hear them in an emergency. Early detection of fire provided by smoke alarms gives you the extra seconds you need to get out safely.

LEARN two ways out of every room. Practice a home fire escape plan with everyone in your home before a fire starts so you and your family can get out quickly.

Alarms: It's The Law! Every home in Ontario must have a working smoke alarm on every storey and outside all sleeping areas.

Homeowners: must install and maintain smoke alarms on every storey of their home and outside sleeping areas.

Landlords: must ensure their rental properties comply with the law.

Tenants: contact your landlord immediately if you do not have the required number of smoke alarms. It is against the law for tenants to remove the batteries or tamper with the alarm in any way.

Failure to comply with the Fire Code smoke alarm requirements could result in a ticket for \$360 or a fine of up to \$50,000 for individuals or \$100,000 for corporations.

On Monday, May 28 2018 the Town of Deep River and Canadian Nuclear Laboratories (CNL) signed a Fire Protection Services Agreement that builds on the interim agreement that was signed in December 2017. The Agreement is effective June 1, 2018 and remains in force until March 31, 2021 with an option to extend the agreement or renegotiate it at that time.

This new Agreement bolsters the existing fire service in Deep River and enhances capacity through the expertise and leadership of CNL Fire Operations, supporting a return to 24/7 coverage in the Deep River fire hall. At the same time, the Town in partnership with CNL, has begun to attract, recruit, and train volunteer firefighters.

This complement of current full-time Deep River firefighters, together with volunteers, will be trained and provided operational oversight by CNL senior fire personnel.

Deep River Police Service

"Serving our Community"

The Deep River Police is a community driven police service serving the Town of Deep River. It is an evolving police service that has adapted to the needs of the town.

For this reason some of the services that are offered include:

- Vacant house checks where a home owner can request regular police checks during prolonged absence from their home
- Nightly business property checks, ensuring the businesses are secure and no break and enter or damage has occurred during the night.
- Yearly bicycle rodeos at Deep River schools and summer camps to ensure our Deep River youth have a safe bicycle riding season.
- Presentations to various groups on topics such as fraud prevention, winter driving and elder abuse.



The Deep River Police understand that prevention is the key to a safe community and therefore have engaged in the RIDE programs, distracted driving campaigns and will now focus on the new legislation regarding the legalization of marijuana. To deter driving a motor vehicle while impaired, several officers have been trained and continue to be trained in the standard field sobriety test which is used to determine a person's impairment.

The Deep River Police continue to be a self-sufficient police service and do so by ensuring officers are trained in specific fields of enforcement such as sexual and domestic assault, fraud, child abuse, and evidence collection to name a few. The Deep River Police are also capable of training their own officers on yearly requirements such as use of force and firearm training.

The Deep River Police Service values the relationship with other Police services and Police Training facilities for sharing of information, assistance and remaining current in legislation.

All of the Deep River Police men and women are dedicated and proud of the work they do for our community. We encourage our community members to approach and get to know the Deep River officers and if you have any questions please do not hesitate to ask.

PUBLIC WORKS

Project Updates



Clean Water/Waste Water Fund 2017/2018

The Clean water and wastewater fund is a federally and provincially funded program to improve water and wastewater infrastructure in Ontario. For the Town of Deep River approximately \$430,000 in projects has been approved. To date we have completed significant upgrades to the Low lift pumping station, pump house and made significant progress on upgrades to the waste water treatment plant that will help deal with ongoing capacity issues and improving energy performance.

Sanitary sewer main replacement and relining projects are also included under this funding with projects scheduled for the Fall of 2018. Both of these projects will reduce the infiltration of ground water into the system while extending the usable life of this system.

Water Treatment Plant Filter System

With Council approval Town staff worked with OCWA, Jp2g Consulting and several contractors to rebuild one of the three main filter tanks at the Water Treatment Plant. This project came in on budget and on schedule and the filter system is currently working at a high performance level. The other two filter tanks are currently being assessed, but at this point are not exhibiting any symptoms of having the same deficiencies as the first tank. Staff will work with OCWA to continue to inspect and evaluate the performance of these tanks.

Chadwick Drive

A significant storm sewer replacement project was approved by Council to remedy a major infrastructure failure on the lower section of Chadwick Drive. The failed storm sewer had caused several sink holes and if not addressed could have caused major damage to the area. This project is well underway with full completion expected by the end of October 2018.

DID YOU KNOW

The Deep River Public Works Department will pick up oversized items throughout the year, including mattresses, box springs, carpets, upholstered furniture, refrigerators and freezers. You are required to purchase a permit as tipping fees are associated with these items. Permits can be purchased at Town Hall for \$20.00. To schedule your pick up, please call 613-584-2000 extension 107.

FALL YARD WASTE PICK UP - NOVEMBER 5 THROUGH 9, 2018

Public Works staff will collect yard waste the week of November 5th - 12th, 2018. Leaves, pine needles and plants must be placed at the curb in biodegradable bags by 7:00 AM on November 5th, 2018. Tree branches and other brush will not be picked up but can be taken to the Baggs Road Landfill site throughout the year at no charge. Only one pass will be made for each street so please ensure that your bags are out ahead of time. We will do our best to pick up broken bags but will not rake contents that have been spilled out of bags (Note: Do not place out prior to Halloween night).

Christmas Tree Disposal

Christmas Trees may be placed curbside making sure not to interfere with waste collection and recycle collection or snow removal services. The Town will ensure that all Christmas trees placed at the curbside will be collected by January 18th, 2019. Alternatively, Christmas trees can be dropped off free of charge at the Baggs Road Landfill site.

Residential Bag Limit

Deep River has a two (2) bag limit for residential household waste collection. Businesses are exempt from these bag limits. The purpose of this bag limit is to encourage all residents to recycle. Increased diversion of waste will increase the life of local landfills and reduce waste management costs for residents.





Two bags are defined as two individual garbage bags or two waste containers that hold a maximum combined volume of 154 litres of household waste. (A standard garbage bag measuring 26"x32" equals 77 litres.)



What if I have more than "two bags"?

You can purchase bag tags and attach them to all bags in excess of the two (2) bag limit. Bag tags can be purchased Monday through Friday from 8:30 am to 5:00 pm at Town Hall for \$2.00 per bag tag. Revenues from the sale of bag tags will be allocated to the future closure costs of the Baggs Road Landfill Site.

Hydrant Flushing Notice

Please be advised that hydrant flushing will commence on the **West side October 1**st - **19**th **2018** *and on* the **East side October 22**nd - **November 9**th, **2018**.

Residents throughout the Town may experience a drop in water pressure and water may be discoloured due to flushing of the distribution system. If you have discoloured water please run your COLD WATER TAPS ONLY (suggested taps: outside hose, bathtub or laundry tub) until the water is clear.

Please DO NOT use your hot water until you have clear running water again.

Tin cans (place lid inside and pinch can so lid stays inside), open and empty paint cans (NO PLASTIC WITH METAL TOPS AND/OR BOTTOMS OR HANDLES). Aluminum cans, pie plates, trays and foil wrap (no foil with paper or plastic laminate). Clear and coloured glass food and beverage bottles and jars scraped and rinsed clean (NO CERAMICS, TEMPERED GLASS OR MIRRORS) Plastic food and beverage containers: #1 PET bottles, #2 to #7 bottles, tubs and lids, Milk and juice containers, ice cream containers, rinsed. Plastic bags should be placed inside one bag.




PLEASE SORT ALL LOADS BEFORE GOING TO THE SITE

Waste & recyclables must originate from the Town of Laurentian Hills or the Town of Deep River. Tipping permits can be purchased at your local municipal office during regular hours or by paying cash on site.



DIRECTIONS TO BAGGS ROAD LANDFILL

From Deep River take Highway 17 east to Chalk River, turn left at lights onto Plant Road, then turn left onto Baggs Road (just before AECL's outer gate). The North Renfrew landfill site is approximately 2.6 KM down the road on the left hand side.





LOCATES

When excavating to install fences, repair driveways, plant trees, etc. Contact Ontario One Call before you dig by either using the online locate form www.on1call.com/ or call: 1-800-400-2255 for Town of Deep River water/sewer, Bell, Enbridge Gas, Cogeco Cable and Hydro One locates.

A commonly asked question in Deep River: I have locate paint on my property, and I did not request a locate. Can you tell me who did?

Answer: Excavators request locates for a variety of reasons. Cities dig to repair water and sewer lines or rebuild roads/sidewalks. Infrastructure owners dig to repair or upgrade their lines, etc. Please keep in mind that the municipality you live in, technically, "owns" the land up to your property line. If they must excavate on the publicly owned portion of the property, they may do so without consulting you first. While there is no arguing that you own your private property, the infrastructure buried underneath that property are owned by the respective owner. It is the policy of most companies and certainly a courtesy to notify you of any planned excavation.

ON1Call's Privacy Policy forbids ON1Call Representatives from discussing locate requests with anyone but the person who requested the locate, an ON1Call member, or a third party investigative body/legal body. If you are requesting a property line locate as part of a Town building permit process please contact the Public Works Department at 613-584-2000 extension 107.

MILLER ROAD - CONSTRUCTION AND DEMOLITION WASTE DISPOSAL SITE

Permits can be purchased at the Municipal Office in Deep River from Monday to Friday 8:30 am to 5:00pm or on site at Millers Road (cash only).

Hours of Operation: Tuesday to Saturday - 9:00 AM. to 12:00 PM

Construction & demolition waste is defined as "all non-hazardous, low metal content waste from construction and demolition clean-up projects, consisting primarily of wood, blocks/stone/bricks, non-metal roofing material, insulation, waste furniture (wood only), window glass, non-metal siding material, concrete, and small amounts of plastic and fibreglass." This waste must be brought to the Miller's Road landfill site. Miller Road is located east of Deep River on the left hand side of the road off of Highway 17.

WHAT IS NOT RECYCLABLE IN THE BLUE BOX?

Car tires, car parts, dirty flower Pots and/or no recycle symbol, pots and pans, zippered plastic bags (usually for blankets or bed-in-a-bag sets), solar blankets, fiber glass feed bags, Styrofoam of any kind, Styrofoam packing pellets, and Styrofoam glued with any other material, bubble wrap, sponge foam, foam sheeting, small or large appliances, hard cover books, plastic or metal strapping, picture frames, plastic with metal paint pails, hangers, oil containers, compost, glass or ceramic dishes, Tupperware, Rubbermaid, plastic toys, window pane glass, wood diapers, electronics of any kind.

COMMON REASONS YOUR RECYCLING MAY NOT HAVE BEEN PICKED UP

Recycling other than shredded paper or plastic film was in a bag | Recycling was not set out on time when the truck passed by | Material was not sorted properly and/or was mixed (comingled) | There were significant non-recyclable items mixed with acceptable recyclables | The "plain view" of your container was blocked from the driver's view, Blue Boxes must be no larger than $18" \times 20" \times 21"$, not necessarily "Blue", no wheels or lids

TIPS AND TRICKS FOR RECYCLING

- ♦ It is best to lay a small piece of cardboard (i.e. cardboard from case of pop) flat on top of other paper to keep them from blowing away. It usually fits snugly like an inside lid!
- ♦ Handwashing dishes? Use your leftover dishwater to wash recyclables when you are done.

PARKING AND SNOW REMOVAL

Parking Interfering with Movement of Traffic and Removal of Snow is Prohibited

As per Section 170 (12) of the Provincial Offences Act: No person shall park or stand a vehicle on any highway (including road or back lane) in such a manner as to interfere with the movement of traffic, or the clearing of snow from such highway as outlined in By-law Number 28-2018, Section 2.09 a By-law regulating the parking of vehicles. Parked cars are an obstacle to safe and efficient weather response efforts. We thank you for your cooperation in helping us keep the Town roads clear for the safety and convenience of all residents.

2.09 No Overnight Parking in Winter:

- (a) no person shall park a vehicle on Champlain Street from Deep River Road to Ridge Road, from November 1st of one year to April 30th of the following year at any time between 3:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m., or during such shorter period as identified by authorized signs and no person shall park a vehicle on any other highway from November 1st of one year to April 30th of the following year at any time between 11:00 p.m. and 6:00 a.m., or during such shorter period as identified by authorized signs.
- 2.13 : No person shall park or stop a vehicle in any of the following places:
- (Q) in a manner that interferes with the maintenance and repair of highways and utilities, or with the removal of snow:

Snow Removal Activities

The Town gives the highest priority for the removal of snow and ice from roadways to the main routes that carry the most traffic. The goal is to quickly make these roadways passable and remove the snow and ice as soon as practical considering the duration of the storm, accumulation and temperatures. Local streets are plowed simultaneously with priority routes. The Town's third priority for snow and ice removal is all other traffic lanes including back lanes. The Town will make these lanes passable as soon as practical.

One of the most frequently asked question is "Why do the plow trucks block my driveway with snow?" We apologize for this inconvenience, but this is the only practical way to try to clear the roadways of snow and ice for traffic. It is the responsibility of the property owner to clear their driveway if they must get out. When removing snow from your driveway it is best to move it to the right side of your driveway if you are facing the roadway.

Depositing Snow Removal or Ice on the Traveled Portion of a Highway

By-law No. 5-86 states that it is illegal to deposit snow or ice on any roadway within the limits of the Town. No person shall for the purpose of cleaning or clearing of any driveway or other property, or for any other purpose, deposit or cause to be deposited snow or ice from such driveway or property on any roadway. Any person contravening the provisions of this By-law shall be subject to a fine not exceeding \$1,000.00 exclusive of costs.
