Incredibly, we are in the last months of this term of Council. The days have been busy and time has passed quickly! In this newsletter, I want to highlight a few initiatives and share some of the work that you may not "see" in the normal course of municipal activities.

Governance

A recent review and update of the Strategic Plan that set Council's goals for this term demonstrated the incredible amount of work that has been completed. Housing

New housing for seniors and CNL employees locating to the area is critical. We need newcomers to choose Deep River as their home! Staff are working on a Housing Directory to help with short term housing needs. If you have a room, apartment or house available, you will be able to post it to help accommodate new residents with short and long term housing needs. Stay tuned for more information to come on this project!

Members of the Housing Committee are working on a new initiative, exploring partnership possibilities and Kerryhill Court Condominiums is preparing to start Phase 2, for 23 new units, with work set to begin this Spring. In addition to this, with a number of proven builders approaching town hall, we anticipate further housing proposals in the future.

Fire Service

Deep River has an Interim Fire Service Agreement with CNL. Negotiations for a Long Service Agreement continue with final details expected to be completed prior to June 30, 2018.

IT IS SPRING - IT IS BUILDING TIME!

Spring has sprung...warm weather is here... “Wouldn’t a deck be nice? Why don’t we take that part of the wall out and put in French doors? Or maybe a sun porch, screened in to keep the bugs out?” “OK lets do it.”

“Hey wait — do we need a building permit?”

“You know, I’m not sure...” If you are not sure, call our Chief Building Official (CBO). Robert will be able to answer all of your building questions. There are many renovations, additions and changes to buildings that people make every day that require building permits. Often, they do not get them. A Building Permit is more than a way to give the municipality more money. It is a method of ensuring that the construction that you are undertaking is up to code. The costs that we charge for a Building Permit are less than the actual costs of administering the Ontario Building Code as required by legislation. A building permit ensures your plans meet standards and that you have an inspector to advise you on your project, even before it begins.

Should you begin your project before it comes to our CBO’s attention, it may cost you considerably more to make necessary corrections to ensure that your building is compliant with the Building Code. Call first. Discuss your plans and make sure that they are up to standard. These standards may appear arduous but are in fact created to ensure that you and future occupants of your house are safe. In today’s world of litigation and insurance, often, before a property can be sold or mortgaged, an Occupancy Permit is required. Our CBO will not be in a position to issue you an Occupancy Permit if you undertook the work without a permit and proper inspections. Often people think — that doesn’t apply to me, I’m only going to... when in doubt, feel free to call town hall at 613-584-2000 to ask any questions you might have regarding building permits.

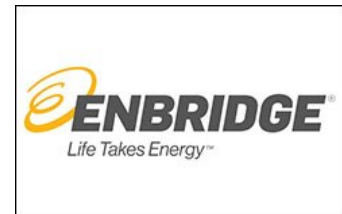

Important Dates To Remember

Tax Billing

May 31, 2018 - Interim tax bill due

August 31, 2018 - First installment of final tax bill due

November 30, 2018 - Second installment of final tax bill due

Water and Sewer Billing

April 30, 2018 - First installment due

October 31, 2018 - Second installment due

The water and sewer rates have been set for 2018. The Water and Sewer rates per unit, for each of the April and October bills are \$303.50 and \$233.50 respectively, for a total of \$1,074.00 per year. The April bill covers the period of January 1 to June 30 and the October bill covers the period of July 1 to December 31.

The bills are sent out at least 3 weeks prior to the due date. Interest on overdue accounts is 1.25% and will be added at the beginning of each month.

Payments may be made at your bank, through on-line banking, telephone banking or at the reception counter at Town Hall. If paying at the reception counter, please note that we ONLY accept cash, cheques or debit. Payments (CHEQUES ONLY) may also be dropped into the night deposit slot located inside the Police - Fire Department door. Payments received through the night deposit slot will not be issued receipts.

If paying through your on-line banking, please note that your bank may require a 6-8 digit account number. Please choose either Deep River Water or Deep River Taxes as the payee, as applicable, and if you have difficulty entering the account number, you will have to insert zeros at the front of your account number to make the required number of digits. Please call the Town Hall if you have any difficulty setting up your payment through your on-line banking.

The Town offers a pre-authorized payment plan for water and sewer, and tax payments. Forms can be picked up at the reception counter at Town Hall or downloaded from the Town website at www.deepriver.ca/departments/finance/. A VOID cheque or a form with your bank information from your bank is required for sign up. The pre-authorized payments are withdrawn from bank accounts on the 15th day of each month.

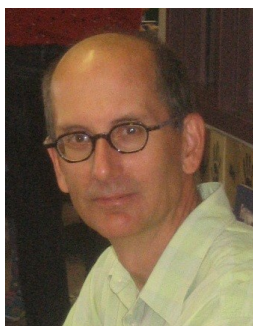

Deep River Public Library

The library offers a wide range of materials for public use. Materials for use within the library include several major newspapers, a selection of current magazine issues, and reference materials. Materials that may be checked out include a range of adult fiction, non-fiction, large print books, magazines, DVDs, talking books, museum passes, and CDs for all tastes. Membership at the Deep River Public Library is free to all residents of Deep River, Laurentian Hills, and the Township of Head, Clara and Maria. Other services include free Wi-Fi, computers for browsing, work stations, a comfy seating area, a black-and-white photocopy machine, and an 1,800 square foot meeting room available to rent. Hours of operation are Monday – Friday, 10am – 5pm and 7pm – 9pm, and Saturday 10am – 3pm.

Children's Programs

Visit the children's area of the library and browse a large collection of board books, picture books, junior fiction and non-fiction, DVDs, CDs, talking books, and junior magazines. Flood Prevention Home Checklist

Around the outside of your Home

Ensure downspouts are directing water away from your home. The end of the downspout should extend approximately five feet away from your home. **Ensure the spout is not directed towards a neighbouring property.** Downspout pipe can be purchased from local hardware stores to help extend the length and direction of your downspout.

Check your lot grading

Ensure the ground around your home, including under decks and stairs, slopes away from the house.

Use silicon caulking to seal cracks and spaces in concert surfaces next to the foundation of the house where water might get in.

Install window wells around your basement windows to keep water out of your basement.

Conduct regular Home maintenance

- If you have window wells around basement windows, check them throughout the year to ensure they are clear of snow in the winter and clear of debris in the spring and fall.
- Clear your eavestroughs regularly to remove leaves, twigs and other debris so they can direct water away from your home.



- Keep storm drains on your street clear of leaves and other debris to keep water from accumulating outside your home.

Consider using a rain barrel to collect overflow water to prevent accumulation around your home.

Additional Ideas

Consider installing a rain garden designed to take advantage of rainfall and storm water runoff in its layout and plant selection.

Flood proof your basement

When finishing a basement, use materials that can stand up to water and moisture. Choose finishing systems that include waterproof wall panels, moisture-proof drop ceilings, mould-proof PVC moldings and water-resistant underfloor systems to help reduce the risk from water damage.

Store valuable family possessions like photos and documents in plastic, water-tight sealed containers.

The Home Flood Protection Program has been developed by the Intact Centre on Climate Adaptation at the University of Waterloo to help homeowners reduce their risk of basement flooding and minimize damage if flooding occurs. The Program offers homeowners free online self-help resources and a custom, fee-for-service flood-risk evaluation, known as the 'Home Flood Protection Assessment'. Strategic Infrastructure Planning

OCWA's Project Planning and Delivery group is providing engineering services to Deep River under a Strategic Infrastructure Planning program. In 2017, the first year of this program, OCWA conducted an initial site investigation to collect water plant data and review site conditions. Using this information, Town officials and OCWA determined which issues and activities were priorities under this program. Two main priorities were identified: Coloured water issues and Collection system Inflow and Infiltration (I&I).

The coloured water investigation determined that the issue seems to be twofold: corrosive water and a heavily deteriorated cast iron distribution system. The solutions that have been considered aim to reduce corrosivity of the water and improve the cast iron piping in the distribution system. OCWA has initiated a Soda Ash pre-treatment trial to reduce corrosivity – the trial is ongoing. The distribution system is being reviewed to correlate complaint locations with flow direction and sampling results. An intensive sampling program for problem areas is being developed to determine which areas should be prioritized.

In order to fully investigate the issues of I&I, OCWA and the Town will be conducting a full gravity system inspection. The data and results gathered from this inspection will inform the next steps for further investigation, remediation or replacement. OCWA is committed to working with the Town of Deep River to meet the needs of the community and its residents.

If you experience coloured water in your taps, flush the tap by running cold water until it runs clear. If the water doesn't clear, please call the Public Works Department at 613-584-2000.



Water Wise Tips

Did you know that only 1% of our planet's water is accessible and fresh? Following water conservation helps reduce costs and environmental impacts and helps to ensure that clean water will be available for future generations. Here are a few tips that everyone can follow:

At home: Check faucets, pipes and toilets for leaks – a small leak can waste gallons of water per day. | Install water-saving shower heads and low-flow faucet aerators – these are simple and inexpensive fixes that you can do yourself. | Always wash full loads in the clothes washer and dishwasher – dishwashers use less water than hand washing! Adjust the water level in the clothes washer to match the size of your load.

In the garden: Use native plants and plants that require little water to thrive in your region – native plants are also more resistant to plant diseases. | Keep soil healthy and add mulch to prevent water loss through evaporation – mulch will also slow weed growth. Water only in the morning to avoid evaporation – watering early in the day is the best defense against slugs and other garden pests too.

Outside: Use a pool cover – it reduces water loss through evaporation, can help saving energy and reduce the need for chemicals. | Sweep outdoor surfaces with a broom instead of using a hose | Don't leave the hose running when washing your car. Use a spray valve on your hose for more efficient water use.

Small adjustments to everyday habits can make a big difference. Make these your habits to help your community conserve water.

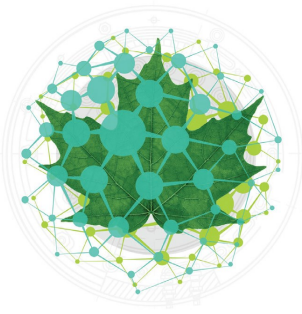

A BIG OPPORTUNITY FOR SMALL MODULAR REACTORS

AN UPDATE FROM CNL

Canadian Nuclear Laboratories (CNL) has a vision for the development of small modular reactors (SMR). We have mentioned it a few times over the past year, but we are now able to fill a few more details, as we move to make that vision become reality. Our vision is two fold; first, we will serve the world as a global hub for SMR research and technology; the second part of our vision for the program is to have a demonstration unit built on a CNL site by 2026. The two are distinct, but closely related.

As a low-carbon source of energy, these reactors are well-aligned with global desire to reduce our carbon footprint; both smaller in size and in energy output, SMRs are considered ideal for deployment both on-grid and off-grid in remote locations such as mine sites or the oil sands, as well as willing communities in northern Canada reliant on diesel-fuelled generators for electricity. In addition, these technologies can also be utilized in other industrial applications such as production of hydrogen, local area heating, or other industrial heat applications.

Canada has a proud track record in the design, construction, licence and operation of small reactors. In Whiteshell, we have the WR-1, an organically cooled research reactor, as well as a SLOWPOKE reactor, another AECL design successfully deployed in universities and research institutions across the globe. In Chalk River, we can point to the ZEEP, NRX, NRU, PTR, and ZED-2 reactors as examples of success in first-of-a-kind deployment. Canada, enabled by the hard work and ingenuity of many

people still resident in Deep River and our surrounding communities, led the world. We will do it again.

Over the past year, we have made great progress in our SMR program. The Request for Expressions of Interest (RFEOI) we launched last year generated over 80 responses from across the globe, with 19 expressions of

interest for a demonstration SMR to be located at a CNL-managed site. Commercial interest in our capabilities continues to grow; our federal S&T program in SMR-related research is growing; and we are making preparations for what promises to be an exciting 2018, and our capabilities are evolving to meet the expected needs of our SMR customers.

While CNL is not intending to be a builder, designer or vendor of an SMR, there are many in the world who do hold those aspirations. At present, there are ten SMR technology developers who have initiated a preliminary vendor design review with the Canadian nuclear regulator. While this is an optional step, it does provide valuable early feedback from the regulator. More information is available on the CNSC website.

Taking a bold first step

In the coming weeks, CNL will open an invitation for applications for those SMR technology developers interested in siting a demonstration unit at a CNL-managed site. This invitation is the first step for many of these vendors towards finding a potential site. Through the application process, CNL will begin looking into a wide range of key questions including aspects of technology readiness, supply chain readiness, regulatory and licensing, ethics and conflicts of interest, waste management and decommissioning,

financial matters and many, other considerations.

This application process will take a matter of months, following which CNL's recommendation would move to Atomic Energy of Canada Limited (AECL) as the landowner for further review before a decision is made. That would then be followed by the licencing and regulatory processes.

All that to say, the coming months will be exciting as we move the program forward. You can expect to hear from CNL more often regarding our vision for the SMR program, and once the Invitation for Applications opens, you may well hear from some SMR developers as well. We welcome your thoughts and input at any time; we are excited about the possibilities ahead and hope you are too.

What is meant by Small Modular Reactor:

Small: For our planning purposes, CNL considers SMRs to produce as little as several hundred kilowatts of electrical output to a maximum of 300 MW. For context, a conventional power reactor is roughly 800 MW electrical.

Modular: This refers to both the construction style (meaning produced in modules) and in how an operator may choose to sequence the reactors. In some cases, an operator may wish to install several in a row, adding or removing as the need for power changes. Modular construction is also thought to have benefits in the transport, installation and decommissioning.

Reactor: Again, designs vary but these are all based on nuclear fission. That said, SMRs introduce new fuels, new materials and new designs with the goal of creating safer, more cost effective and more efficient reactors than in the past.

Quick Facts: CNL's SMR Program

CNL is not building, designing or selling an SMR. Yes, we would love to host such a project on one of our sites, but we are not in the business of designing and building reactors. We are presently exploring the process by which we would enable an SMR vendor or developer to use a CNL site.

Canada is a great place to advance SMR technology. We have a robust but flexible regulator that is open to evaluating new designs. We have a pressing domestic market need for the technology. We have a supply chain that has maintained its nuclear capabilities through the recent refurbishments. And, we have a great national nuclear laboratory to assist every step of the way!

There will be ample opportunity to provide input into any proposed SMR siting. Discussions and community involvement will come part and parcel with the process. Regardless of the technology, it is expected that an Environmental Assessment would be undertaken, which would include frequent and ongoing communications with local communities, Aboriginal groups, elected officials, local business and economic development agencies, citizen groups ... and many more. It would also require a licence application and subsequent review processes, which provide additional opportunities for public engagement.

We may see more than one built at CNL. It is our vision to be a hub for this technology, and as such, it is quite possible that more than one demonstration unit could be built. All of which would require their own licence, independent from CNL's.

Will these make power? Perhaps. Again, it is very early days and lots of questions need answers, but there remains a possibility for CNL or others to purchase electricity produced by the demonstration unit or units.

An SMR is not a replacement for NRU. Though some technology developers are considering ways in which research capabilities could be incorporated into their designs, from our perspective these would be considered as an "added bonus" of sorts. Research is unlikely to be the principle mission of a demonstration SMR.

This goal is achievable. There are lots of different technologies out there, some more advanced than others, and the path to deployment varies for each one of these designs. We believe in the technology, and believe in the team and capabilities at CNL.

Public Works maintains the following municipal infrastructure and facilities and provides the following services: roads, streetlights, sidewalks, storm sewers, sanitary sewer collection and treatment, water treatment and distribution, Deep River Cemetery, garbage and recycling collection, arena, pool, marina, Lamure Beach, Grouse Park, Town Hall, Library and all parks.

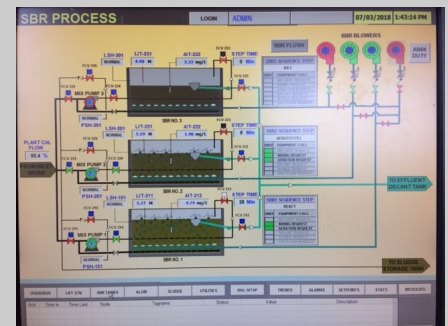
Project Update

Clean Water and Wastewater Fund 2017 / 2018

The Clean Water and Wastewater fund is a federally and provincially funded program to improve water and wastewater infrastructure in Ontario. For the Town of Deep River approximately \$430,000 in projects has been approved. To date we have completed significant upgrades to the Low Lift Pumping Station, Pumphouse and made significant progress on upgrades to the Waste Water Treatment Plant that will help deal with ongoing capacity issues and improving energy performance.

Sanitary sewer main replacement and relining projects are also included under this funding with projects scheduled for the spring of 2018. Both of these projects will reduce the infiltration of ground water into the system while extending the usable life of this system.

The photograph on the right captures a screen shot of the Supervisory Control Advisory Data Acquisition (SCADA) which is the high tech control system that operates the waste water treatment process. The improvements to this system will improve efficiency and help to mitigate capacity issues.



CNL Watermain

The final touches are underway for the commissioning of the CNL Watermain project which included upgrades to the Water Treatment Plant and Low Lift Pumping Station, new water mains within the Town, and approximately 7 km of new water main to the Chalk River site. The project is scheduled to be operational in the spring of 2018.

Chadwick Drive

Staff are working with Council and Jp2g Consulting on a plan to deal with storm sewer deficiencies on Chadwick Drive. This may lead to a significant infrastructure project for lower Chadwick Drive for the summer of 2018.



Spring Clean Up 2018

The annual spring clean-up will commence in the west end of Town on Monday, May 7th and pick-up will then begin in the east end of Town on Monday, May 14th.

Please ensure items are placed at the curb by 7:30 pm the day before collection begins in your area. Items may be set out as early as one week in advance of the scheduled pick up.

In accordance with By-Law No. 10-2012, no person shall use, or permit the use of, any land or structure within the Town of Deep River for dumping, disposing or accumulating of garbage, refuse, or domestic or industrial waste of any kind.

Refuse **must be contained on your property**. Please do not deposit waste on vacant lots or parkland. During spring clean-up please place material on the shoulder of the road next to your driveway.

ITEMS THAT WILL NOT BE PICKED UP INCLUDE:

HOUSEHOLD GARBAGE, RECYCLABLE MATERIALS, CARDBOARD, CONSTRUCTION AND DEMOLITION MATERIAL OF ANY KIND, FURNITURE, MATTRESSES AND BOX SPRINGS, CARPETS, LARGE TREE LIMBS/TRUNKS/STUMPS, PLASTIC TOYS, TIRES OR HOUSEHOLD HAZARDOUS WASTE (HHW) SUCH AS MOTOR OIL, GASOLINE, PAINT CANS, BATTERIES, ANTIFREEZE, ETC., AND ANY OTHER ITEMS NOT LISTED IN THE ACCEPTED ITEMS LIST.

DID YOU KNOW

The Deep River Public Works Department will pick up permitted and oversized items throughout the year. This includes mattresses, box springs, carpets and upholstered furniture, refrigerators and freezers. A permit is required as tipping fees are associated with these items. Permits can be purchased at the Town Hall Reception Desk for a \$20.00 fee. Please schedule your pick up with Public Works at 613-584-2000 extension 107.

Watering Restrictions Apply from May 1st until September 30th (inclusive)

Addresses ending in 0, 2, 4, 6 or 8 may water their lawns on “even numbered calendar dates”, i.e.: May 2nd, June 30th, July 18th, and August 6th.

Addresses ending in 1, 3, 5, 7 or 9 may water their lawns on “odd numbered calendar dates”, i.e., June 3rd, July 15th, August 21st, and September 7th.

The “Permitted Hours” are: 7:30 am to 11:00 am and 6:00 pm to 9:00 pm only.

NOTICE REGARDING STYROFOAM AND FILM PLASTIC BAGS



As of November 1st, 2016, Styrofoam of any kind is no longer collected curb-side within the Town of Deep River. Styrofoam is no longer a marketable recyclable product.

All film plastic bags (bread bags, milk bags, etc.) placed at curbside must be placed within one bag ("a bag of bags") to be collected.

FIBRE RECYCLING

- ◆ Household newspaper, magazines, catalogues, flyers and junk mail
- ◆ Boxboard/Newspaper: cereal boxes, cracker boxes, tissue boxes, "paper" egg cartons, toilet paper/paper towel rolls
- ◆ Office paper: writing/typing/computer, clear bag of shredded paper
- ◆ Cardboard (corrugated) brown "craft" paper bags, paper pet food bags (coated liner is ok)



COMMINGLED CONTAINER RECYCLING

- ◆ Tin cans (place lid inside and pinch can so lid stays inside), open and empty paint cans (NO PLASTIC WITH METAL TOPS AND/OR BOTTOMS OR HANDLES)
- ◆ Aluminum cans, pie plates, trays and foil wrap (no foil with paper or plastic laminate)
- ◆ Clear and coloured glass food and beverage bottles and jars scraped and rinsed clean (NO CERAMICS, TEMPERED GLASS OR MIRRORS)
- ◆ Plastic food and beverage containers: #1 PET bottles, #2 to #7 bottles, tubs and lids
- ◆ Milk and juice containers, ice cream containers, rinsed and clean
- ◆ #4 Film Plastic: grocery and shopping bags, outer wrap from cases of water, toilet paper and paper towels (place all of these in one bag - a bag of bags).

REMINDER

Flatten and bundle all corrugated cardboard to a maximum size of 30"X30"X8".

Please ensure that bottles and cans and containers are in a separate container to that of paper, cardboard and other fiber products. Mixed bins will not be picked up. Place recyclables beside the road or curb by 7:00 am on your designated collection day.



WHAT IS NOT RECYCLABLE IN THE BLUE BOX?

Car tires, car parts, dirty flower pots and/or no recycle symbol, pans, zippered plastic bags (usually for blankets or bed-in-a-bag sets), solar blankets, fiber glass feed bags, Styrofoam of any kind, Styrofoam packing pellets, Styrofoam glued with any other material, bubble wrap, sponge foam, foam sheeting, small or large appliances, hard cover books, plastic or metal strapping, picture frames, plastic with metal paint pails, hangers, oil containers, compost, glass or ceramic dishes, Tupperware, Rubbermaid, plastic toys, window pane glass, wood, diapers, electronics of any kind.

COMMON REASONS YOUR RECYCLING MAY NOT HAVE BEEN PICKED UP

Recycling other than shredded paper or plastic film was in a bag. It takes too long to open up thousands of recycling bags and also products stick inside. | Recycling was not set out on time when the truck passed by | Material was not sorted properly and/or was mixed (comingled) | There were significant non-recyclable items mixed with acceptable recyclables | The “plain view” of your container was blocked from the driver’s view. *Blue Boxes must be no larger than 18” x 20” x 21”, not necessarily “Blue”, no wheels or lids.*

TIPS AND TRICKS FOR RECYCLING

It is best to lay a small piece of cardboard (i.e. cardboard from case of pop) flat on top of other paper to keep from blowing away. It usually fits snugly like an inside lid!

Handwashing dishes? Use your leftover dishwater to wash recyclables when you are done—especially the tough ones like peanut butter jars, ketchup, mustard, mayonnaise and cheese spread. If containers are dirty they must be landfilled! If you are short on space to set your blue boxes side by side, try the stacking cart. It is just like a “dollie” and makes it easier to take to the curb on recycle day. Stacking carts are available at most department stores.

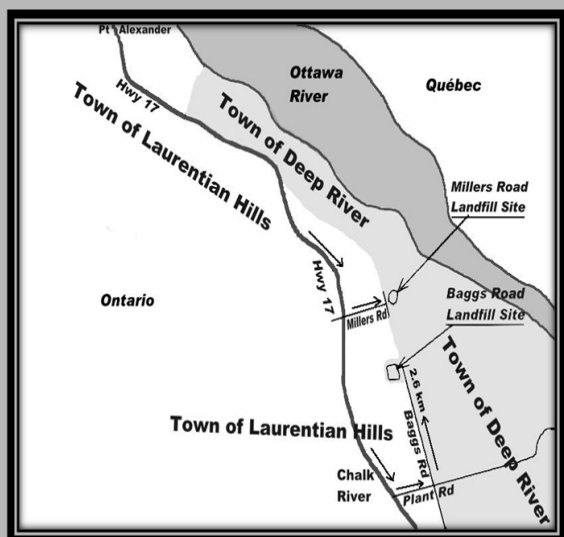

Residential Bag Limit

Deep River implemented a two (2) bag limit for residential household waste collection in May of 2017. Businesses are exempt from these bag limits. The purpose of this bag limit is to encourage all residents to recycle. Increased diversion of waste will increase the life of local landfills and reduce waste management costs for residents.

Definition of Two (2) Bags



Two bags are defined as two individual garbage bags or two waste containers that hold a maximum combined volume of 154 litres of household waste. (A standard garbage bag measuring 26"x32" equals 77 litres.)



What if I have more than "two bags"?

You can purchase bag tags and attach them to all bags in excess of the two (2) bag limit. Bag tags can be purchased Monday through Friday from 8:30 am to 5:00 pm at Town Hall for \$2.00 per bag tag. Revenues from the sale of bag tags will be allocated to the future closing costs of the Baggs Road Landfill Site.

MILLER ROAD – CONSTRUCTION AND DEMOLITION WASTE DISPOSAL SITE

Permits can be purchased at the Town Hall in Deep River from Monday to Friday 8:30 am to 5:00 pm or on site at Millers Road (cash only).

Construction and demolition waste is defined as “all non-hazardous, low metal content waste from construction and demolition clean-up projects, consisting primarily of wood, blocks/stone/bricks, non-metal roofing material, insulation, waste furniture (wood only), window glass, non-metal siding material, concrete, and small amounts of plastic and fibreglass”. This waste must be brought to the Miller’s Road landfill site. Miller Road is located east of Deep River on the left hand side of the road off of Highway 17.

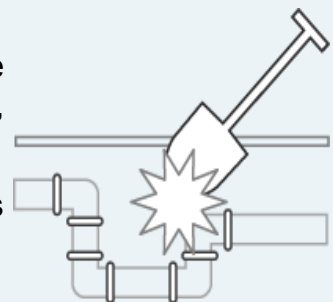


A commonly asked question in Deep River: I have locate paint on my property, and I did not request a locate. Can you tell me who did?

Answer: Excavators request locates for a variety of reasons. Cities dig to repair water and sewer lines or rebuild roads/sidewalks. Infrastructure owners dig to repair or upgrade their lines, etc. Please keep in mind that the municipality you live in, technically “owns” the land up to your property line. If they must excavate on the publicly owned portion of the property, they may do so without consulting you first. While you own your private property, the infrastructure buried underneath that property is owned by the respective owner. It is the policy of most companies and certainly a courtesy to notify you of any planned excavation.

ON1Call’s Privacy Policy forbids ON1Call Representatives from discussing locate requests with anyone but the person who requested the locate, an ON1Call member, or a third party investigative body/legal body.

Note: Dry empty paint cans can be recycled (blue box).



All types of WEEE are acceptable including:

DRDH HAS IMPLEMENTED TRIAGE UPON ARRIVAL

The Deep River and District Hospital has implemented patient flow changes that will mean significant improvements for patient safety.

As of February 6, 2018 the DRDH aligned its process to best practices and has implemented triage upon arrival. Rather than registering first, the current standard of care is for patients to be assessed by an experienced Registered Nurse upon arrival to the Emergency Department. Timely triage assessment allows staff to prioritize level of urgency and facilitate access to physician care based on the acuity of the patient. Triage upon arrival ensures efficient patient flow and increases both patient safety and appropriate delivery of care. Patients will be asked to sit in the red chairs until they have been triaged by a nurse, and then they will be directed appropriately. Only after they have been triaged will patients be asked to register.

GRANT FUNDING PROVIDED TO PLAN NEW PRIMARY CARE BUILDING

The North Renfrew Family Health Team (FHT), in conjunction with Deep River and District Hospital, have signed a Planning Grant with the Ministry of the Health and Long Term Care that will result in the Ministry providing the organization up to \$175,000 in one time capital funding to support the development of a comprehensive business case. The business case will provide the Ministry the information required in the planning for a new primary care building. The funding provides the ability to plan for an appropriate space and work environment that will allow us to better meet patient needs, to facilitate improved patient outcomes and provide an array of programming to the community and patients.



“PAY-by-PLATE” PAID PARKING IMPLEMENTED

Thank you to everyone who has paid for parking and helped preserve DRDH’s services and ability to provide exceptional care. If you have not yet tried out the new kiosks, please be aware that you will need to know your vehicles licence plate and be prepared to pay with either a credit card or COINS of exact change. Also, please remember to pay for parking when you arrive at the Hospital, not when you leave. Failing to pay for parking may result in being ticketed or being towed at the owner’s expense. The rates for parking are as follows:

Parking fees for volunteers, **\$5 for 24 hours** **\$30 for a 30 day pass** **\$300 for a 365 day pass** who are registered with the Hospital, will be waived while these individuals are volunteering on site. In addition, a system is in place to provide free parking to those accessing the Food Bank, as well as North Renfrew Family Services.

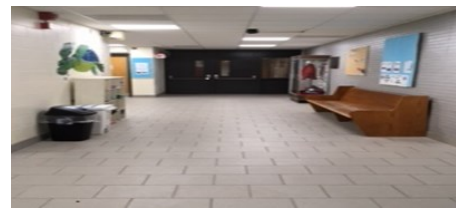

The Lifesaving Society, Canada's leading organization responsible for drowning prevention, has launched an online boating safety program targeted to new boaters, particularly new Canadians who may be experiencing recreational boating for the first time.

STARTboating is a comprehensive program designed to teach basic boating and water safety skills. The program will launch today in English, French, Mandarin, Cantonese, Hindi and Tagalog. Startboating consists of a series of online, interactive videos, which guide the user through the basic skills needed to safely enjoy a day on the water. While suitable for all boaters, the program was developed with Canada's growing immigrant population, especially newcomer families, in mind. You can find Startboating at www.startboating.ca.

10 SAFE BOATING TIPS:

On average, 125 Canadians drown in boating incidents each year. More than 80 percent are men. More than 80 percent are not wearing life jackets. On the road, you wear your seat belt because you know you will not have time to put it on in an accident. On the water, think about your life jacket the same way. It won't work if you don't wear it.

1. Cold water is deadlier than you think. Prepare for the shock of cold water - always wear a life jacket.
2. Impaired boating is illegal. Leave the alcohol onshore.
3. Check the forecast before you go out. Return to shore immediately if bad weather approaches.
4. Operate powerboats responsibly – don't speed close to shore and slow down when the water is choppy.
5. Stay seated! You can easily fall out of a small powerboat, canoe or kayak.
6. Properly load your boat. An unbalanced or overloaded boat could take on water or capsize.
7. Be prepared. Ensure your vessel has the required safety gear on board, and sufficient fuel.
8. Carry a VHF radio or cell phone in case you need to call for help.
9. Always tell someone where you are going, when you will return and who to call if you are overdue.
10. Get trained. Boating is fun and easy if you know how.

Patricia Wilson, one of our adult lifeguards and swimming instructors at the Deep River Community Pool, received the Commonwealth Honour Award Service Commendation from the Lifesaving Society. This award was in recognition of her volunteer service as Vice Chair of the Lifesaving Society Ontario Area Upper Ottawa Valley. The award was presented in Toronto on March 1st, 2018.

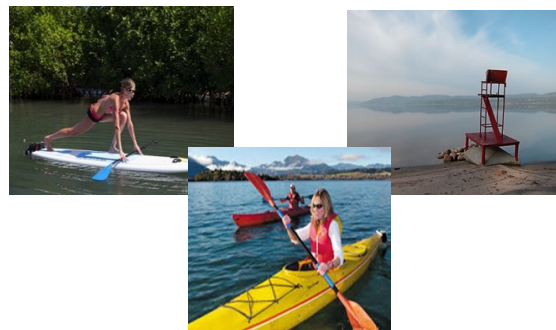
