


STRUCTURE OF THE DRPS

Governance: The Deep River Police Service was formed in conjunction with town's inception in 1957. Governance of the DRPS is provided via the three-member Deep River Police Service Board. In 2023, the DRPSB consisted of Chair, Ms. Tracy Russell, Mayor Sue D'eon and Ms. Kelly Lapping. Mr. Christian Kaiser is the Board Secretary. The Board is responsible for the provision of adequate and effective police services in the municipality.

Administration: Chief of Police Dean Duchrow has primary responsibility for the administration and operations of the Deep River Police Service. He also provides operational backup and coverage on occasion.

Administrative assistant Michelle Russell supports the Chief of Police.







ROAD SAFETY & TRAFFIC ENFORCEMENT

The Deep River Police Service is committed to ensuring the safety of our community, roads and highways. The enforcement of numerous provincial laws, including but not restricted to the Highway Traffic Act, Liquor Licence Control Act, Trespass to Property Act, Cannabis Act, and the Off-Road Motor Vehicle Act are ways in which law enforcement officers achieve this objective. The Highway Traffic Act covers most of the enforcement charges, with speeding being the most common infringement.

During the summer, officers patrolled the roads and trails of Deep River on bicycles, routine traffic stops, and R.I.D.E. programs. 2023 marked the second year of CSP grants which focuses on assistance through prevention. The purpose of the CSP grant is to prevent crime through deterrence and education. Traffic Management and R.I.D.E. programs assist in preventing drivers from committing traffic violations and driving under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs. Bicycle patrols allow officers to patrol trails, back lanes, and other areas inaccessible to vehicles.














RIDE 2023 (REDUCE IMPAIRED DRIVING EVERYWHERE)

During 2023, the Deep River Police Service participated in several Provincial and Federal traffic campaigns such as the Fall distracted driving campaign as well as the festive R.I.D.E (Reduce Impaired Driving Everywhere) program. Our Service was once again able to secure a Provincial grant to support the R.I.D.E. program. See chart below for results:

131 Traffic complaints were responded to by the DRPS.




Community Patrol and Crime Prevention

By establishing a highly visible presence in the community, the Deep River Police Service strive to ensure that our residents know that local police officers are available and accessible when needed. The Deep River Police maintain the ability to respond to incidents and radio calls in a safe and timely manner.

In addition to vehicle and foot patrols, officers conduct regular checks of downtown commercial properties, vacant houses, recreational properties, schools during supervised/unsupervised hours, and highway businesses. During the 2023 cycling season, Deep River Police also conducted bicycle patrol.

As a means of crime prevention, the Deep River Police engaged in the following activities:

- Bi-weekly Renfrew County Community Risk Watch meetings
- Posted weekly North Renfrew Times articles on crime prevention
- Successfully completed violent threat risk assessment training
- Presented in person to the Deep River senior friendship club on road safety during winter driving
- Information shared on the Deep River Police Facebook page during the week of November 5-11th for crime prevention week
- Utilized Crime Stoppers to receive and follow up on tips

COMMUNITY SERVICE

During 2023, the Deep River Police continued to make community service a priority knowing that community mobilization is a useful tactic to aid in crime prevention. Throughout 2023, Deep River Police created 278 occurrences for Community Service which included foot patrols, presentations, and other police-community interactions. The Deep River Police also continued to provide valuable information to the public though social media and various presentations to partner agencies and the public. The current social media that the Deep River Police use are Facebook and X (formerly Twitter). Deep River Police also submit weekly NRT articles on topics such as winter driving, drug awareness, fraud prevention, bicycle, and vehicle safety, and lock it or lose it.

COMMUNITY SERVICE (cont.)



In the spring of 2023, Cst Brela and Slattery completed the annual Bicycle Safety Rodeo for elementary students. The program is provided to grade 1-4/5 students to ensure they are familiar with road safety, equipment, and bicycle specific laws. The program is designed to encourage participation by having students attend with their own bicycles and go through an obstacle course mimicking an intersection, obstructions on the road, and riding in groups.

Officers conducted an anti-bullying presentation at both Mackenzie and St Mary's school to continue efforts to eliminate bullying with children at schools.





COMMUNITY SERVICE (cont.)

During the spring of 2023, officers worked closely with the Deep River hospital to engage in a training exercise for code white. Code white is an emergency response for a violent person who is threatening their own safety, the safety of others, or destruction of property.



Deep River officers also participated in community events such as St Mary's fun day, Pride Flag raising at town hall, Organ donation month and Canada Day festivities.





COMMUNITY SERVICE (cont.)

2023 was the second year of the Community Safety in Policing grant (CSP) which focused on Assistance Through Prevention. The focus of the CSP grant is to prevent crime through deterrence and education. Traffic Enforcement and R.I.D.E. programs deter motorists from committing traffic infractions and impaired driving by alcohol and or drug. Bicycle patrols give officers an opportunity to patrol trails, back lanes, and other areas that vehicles do not have access to.

Another component of the CSP grant is education. It is believed that education is a key component in ensuring residents do not become a victim by recognizing criminal offences. In 2023, officers delivered numerous presentations on fraud prevention, mental health, human trafficking, and impaired driving. Through the grant the police service also began the process of getting two cameras installed to monitor the downtown core on Champlain Street. This is another way that the police service is preventing crime by deterrence.

COMMUNITY SERVICE (cont.)

Officers play an active role in promoting bicycle safety at the two schools in Deep River, where they educate students on fundamental cycling skills and emphasize the significance of road safety. This happens annually towards the conclusion of the academic year.

In May and November officers enthusiastically participated in the Smile Cookie campaign alongside Tim Hortons. The funds raised were allocated to North Renfrew Family Services and the Deep River & District Health Foundation.

Every December, the Deep River Police organize a Cram the Cruiser" event at a local grocery store. Officers park their cruiser and collect both cash donations and non-perishable food items for our local food bank.

This year, the Deep River Police collected a total of \$2310.00 in monetary contributions along with 72 boxes full of food. We extend our gratitude to the Deep River community for their kind and generous support.

Deep River officers paid a visit to Mackenzie Community School and provided support to grade 5 students in tidying up the school's front garden.

In August, the Deep River Police actively took part in the Storytime program held at the Deep River Library by reading books to children and engaging in craft activities with them afterwards.

Officers were involved in bringing happiness to the Deep River arena by using radar to measure the speed of slap shots for the U9 Rep team of Deep River Area and Minor Hockey Association.



ASSISTANCE TO VICTIMS

A priority of the Deep River Police Service is to ensure support for those who've been victimized as a result of a crime or tragic event. A vital means of providing support is through a referral system to address their needs and reduce the potential of revictimization.

As a result of Police interaction, individuals and families are directed with appropriate communitybased referrals through collaboration with Victim Services of Renfrew County, Victim/Witness Assistance Program, the Mental Health Crisis Team and Family and Children Services.

Through education and awareness, the DRPS provides victims with information pertaining to safety planning to effectively reduce the risk of being re-victimized.

DRPS provides the community with tips on Crime Prevention Through Environmental Design (CPTED) by providing strategies to reduce the risk of residents falling victim to criminal behavior. Suggestions include unobstructed views around their home or businesses, better lighting, and removing any articles that could benefit the perpetrator in committing a crime.

The DRPS is an active member of the Domestic Violence Community Coordinating Committee as well as the Renfrew County Domestic Violence Advisory Committee.






COST OF POLICING

Our organization is a cost-effective service, directly accountable at a local level. As a partner in the town's financial strategy, we participate in the town's budgeting process, and are aware of the need to be fiscally responsible to the residents of Deep River. See below graph for budget comparison.

Revenue for the service is acquired through grants and miscellaneous revenues such as criminal record checks. Revenues in 2023 included a grant of \$28 104 for community policing through the Ministry of Community Safety and Correctional Services, a grant of \$7 078 to enhance regular Reduce Impaired Driving Everywhere (R.I.D.E) programs and approximately \$109 638 in revenue from the criminal record checks. This amount can vary significantly depending on demand. The Deep River Police continue to provide free criminal record checks for volunteers in Deep River. The established operating budget for 2023 was \$1 645 594. The year end result showed an actual expenditure of \$1 635 357. A difference of \$10 237 . Given the significant rise in costs related to most consumer products including fuel etc., coming in under budget is a credit to our fiscal awareness . Our budgeting for 2023 remained realistic, accountable, and provided the means for adequate staffing and resources.





Public Complaints
