

2022 Recreation Parks & Facilities Overview

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1.0 Executive Summary

The Town of Deep River is home to an extensive network of indoor and outdoor recreational parks and facilities, offered through both the private and public sector. Over many decades, the Town of Deep River, along with partnering community groups, has invested in recreation and culture throughout the Town to evolve, expand and improve recreational parks, facilities and services. However, recent public engagement suggests that there is a demand for future expansion and a need for investment to further evolve recreation and culture as well as maintain, renovate, or redevelop current recreational parks and facilities throughout the Town.

The focus of this document is to provide an overview of Recreational Parks and Facilities owned and operated by the Town of Deep River, and the initial community consultation which has resulted in a number of recommended possible actions. Staff will continue to engage the community to develop a Recreation and Culture Plan for potential adoption by Council. This plan could be used to assist staff and Council with future budgetary processes.

It should be noted that the survey and this overview are primarily focused on Town-owned "recreation". The strategy going forward will be to broaden the scope to include a focus on recreation and culture within the community while ensuring engagement with and representation of community recreation and culture facilities, events and programming that are not Town-owned or operated.

2.0 Current Inventory

As outlined below in Table 1, there are currently nine Recreational Parks and five Recreational Facilities operated and/or maintained by staff to provide recreational services to the community.

3.0 Current Usage

The initial consultations and survey with the public demonstrate that the nine Recreational Parks and five Recreational Facilities are important assets to the community and are well utilized; with a large number of participants enjoying parks and open spaces, walking or hiking trails, going to the beach, hockey, figure skating, ice skating and soccer. Table 3 below summarizes the different usages (recreation programs vs informal recreation activities) that occur at the parks and facilities throughout the Town of Deep River.

4.0 Future Usage

The initial consultation and survey results identify that there is a demand for investment in both existing and new Town Parks and Facilities and provides suggestions for areas of improvement as well as possible future usage (See Appendix B – Survey Results). This identified demand for investment aligns with projects staff have already begun to implement through the capital and operating budgets. For example, staff are making improvements to facilities and are currently in year two of a proposed five-year Arena improvement plan, are currently undertaking a structural and mechanical audit of the swimming pool, will be implementing accessibility mats at Lamure Beach, and have completed the Grouse Park Improvements Project. Also, by the end of 2022 all parks and play structures within the Town will align with the CSA Z614:20 – Children's Playground Equipment and Surfacing Standard, which is a National Standard of Canada that provides requirements for public-use playground equipment. Furthermore, the survey results indicated a need for a children's dance program which was implemented in the winter of 2021 with great success and has expanded to include a dance class for older adults.

The survey results and public engagement also suggest that there is a high demand for:

- More recreational opportunities for teens (13-18 years)
- Splash Pad
- Camping Grounds/Site
- Bike and/or Skate Park
- Mini Putt
- Dog Park

Staff, utilizing the recommendations from the survey, have begun and will continue to explore the feasibility of the possible options for both new and existing Town Parks and Facilities. However, initial improvements and possibilities include the following;

Grouse Park

- Splash Pad location with gray water holding tank to be utilized as sprinkler system water
- Outdoor rink: one year trial (COVID free) with a review period
- Bike and/or Skate Park

- Mini Putt
- Horticultural Society Tree Nursery additional garden plot at community gardens
- Utilization of structure with canteen availability









7.0 Appendix B - Survey Results

<u>Question 1:</u> Please select any of the following activities that you or anyone in your household have participated in during the past 24 months or plan to participate in over the next 12 months.




<u>Question 2:</u> Please select any of the following leisure activities that you or anyone in your household have participated in during the past 24 months or plan to participate in over the next 12 months.




<u>Question 3:</u> If you and/or members of your household are not able to participate in recreation and parks activities as often as you would like, please indicate why.

We did not participate as often as they would like because:




<u>Question 4:</u> If your household participates in recreation and parks activities outside of Deep River, please indicate why




<u>Question 5:</u> Please indicate your level of satisfaction with the recreation and parks opportunities in Deep River for the following age groups.

How satisfied are with recreation and parks opportunities for:




Question 6: In general, how important are the following recreation and parks facilities to your household?

How important are these recreation and parks facilities to you?




<u>Question 7:</u> What is your level of satisfaction with the following recreation and parks facilities within Deep River?

Question 8: What are the top three (3) new or existing facilities you think the Town should invest in?





<u>Question 9:</u> Please indicate your level of agreement with the following statements about recreation and parks in Deep River.




<u>Question 10 and 11:</u> How many people, including yourself, live in your household? Please indicate the total number of persons within your household that fall into the following age categories.
