Millers Road Landfill: Construction & Demolition Waste
Operating hours are: Tuesday to Saturday – 9 a.m. to 12p.m.

Construction & demolition waste is defined as "all non-hazardous, low metal content waste from construction and demolition clean-up projects, consisting primarily of wood, blocks/stone/bricks, non-metal roofing material, insulation, waste furniture (wood only), window glass, non-metal siding material, concrete, and small amounts of plastic and fiberglass." No Charge:
Recyclables, select compostable materials (branches less than 5 inches in diameter, leaves, grass clippings & garden waste), electronic and electrical equipment, scrap metal, tire recycling, hazardous waste Items include: Motor oil, paint, automotive batteries, compressed gas cylinders (ex. Propane, butane), refrigerant-containing appliances (ex. Refrigerators, dehumidifiers), gasoline, diesel fuel, solvents, heating oil, dry cell batteries, fertilizers, pesticides, antifreeze, acids, alkaline wastes, organic/inorganic chemicals, and fluorescent lights.

Hydrocarbon Contaminated Soil: Must have a completed analysis and be approved by the Coordinator (613) 584-9194.

Watering Restrictions

APPLY FROM MAY 1 UNTIL SEPTEMBER 30 (INCLUSIVE).

Addresses ending in 0, 2, 4, 6 or 8 may water their lawns on "even numbered calendar dates", i.e.: May 2nd, June 30th, July 18th, and August 6th.

Addresses ending in 1, 3, 5, 7 or 9 may water their lawns on "odd numbered calendar dates", i.e., June 3rd, July 15th, August 21st, and September 7th.

The only permitted watering hours are: 7:30 - 11am and 6 - 9pm

PREVENT heat-related emergencies

- **DRINK** plenty of fluids
- **AVOID** being outside during the hottest part of the day
- Wear light, **LOOSE CLOTHING** and always wear a **HAT**
- Apply **SUNSCREEN**
- Take a lot of breaks in a cool or **SHADY AREA**

Unused/Expired Medication Drop-off

Unused or expired prescription drugs can accumulate in our homes and could present a hazard to children or the patient.

The illicit use and/or misuse of pharmaceuticals, in particular narcotic opioids, has become an issue of increasing concern with impacts on public safety and community well-being. Trends indicate rising rates of recreational misuse of prescription drugs by youth, the majority of whom obtain these drugs from family medicine cabinets and from friends.

In Canada, prescription drug misuse represents a complex and growing problem affecting many communities from several perspectives. In some regions, health professionals have identified opioid misuse in particular as a public health crisis due to rates of addiction, recreational misuse, and overdose deaths.

From an enforcement perspective, the criminality associated with prescription drug misuse includes fraudulent use of the health care system, drug-impaired driving, and more traditional drug trafficking activity.

The Deep River Police Service suggest every household check their medicine cabinet or location they store medication and remove any unused, leftover or expired medication. The medication can then be taken to any of the three pharmacies in Deep River for disposal, I.D.A. Drug Mart, Cahoon's Pharmacy and Deep River Pharmacy Health Med.

Do not flush these medications down the drain as they can contaminate our lakes and streams.
