Wildlife Collision **Prevention**





The Ontario Ministry of Transportation recognizes that roads may cross wildlife ecosystems and as such we plan, design, build, operate and maintain a transportation network with the safety of both the users and the environment in mind.

Every year, in Ontario, there are about 12,000 deer and wildlife collisions, leading to approximately 400 human injuries.

Small or Big Animal: React Appropriately

Small animals such as turtles, turkeys, squirrels, raccoons, etc. pose a different type of hazard on the road. Drivers must respond to small/medium wildlife on the road in a different manner than they would to large wildlife.

Tips to Avoid Collisions with Small Animals

- Avoiding a collision with a small animal could result in losing control or putting someone's life in danger.
- If you come across a small animal, do not swerve! Drivers who swerve are more likely to hit an obstacle or lose control of their car.
- Watch your speed to avoid hard braking.

Drivers behind you may not see the animal and may not be prepared to stop suddenly which could result in a collision.

Emergency Preparedness: Be Ready for Anything

Natural disasters may be beyond our control, but there are ways to reduce the risk and the impact of whatever emergency we might face.

Emergency Preparedness Week (May 1-7, 2022) encourages Canadians to take concrete actions to be better prepared to protect themselves and their families during emergencies.

By taking a few simple steps, you can become better prepared to face a range of emergencies – anytime, anywhere. It is important to:

- Know the risks Although the consequences of disasters can be similar, knowing the risks specific to our community and our region can help you better prepare.
- Make a plan It will help you and your family know what to do
- Get an emergency kit During an emergency, we will all need some basic supplies. We may need to get by without power or tap water. Be prepared to be self-sufficient for at least 72 hours in an emergency.

This week, I encourage you to take concrete actions to be better prepared. Please do your part! Experience has shown that individual preparedness goes a long way to help people cope better - both during and after a major disaster. Get an emergency kit now - it can make a world of difference.

Hydrant Flushing Notice

Please be advised that hydrant flushing will commence in the Town of Deep River beginning on Monday April 11th, 2022. Flushing will run until Friday May 20th, 2022, but may be extended due to unforeseeable circumstances, please check the NRT and Town website for any changes to these dates.

Flushing is part of a routine maintenance program that is necessary to maintain the integrity of the water system, remove sediment from water mains, verify the proper operation of hydrants and valves, and maintain firefighting capability.

Residents throughout Town may experience a drop in water pressure and water may be rusty or cloudy due to flushing of the distribution system. If you have rust-coloured water please run your COLD WATER TAPS ONLY (suggested taps: outside hose, bathtub or laundry tub) until the water is clear.

Please DO NOT use your hot water until you have clean running water again.

SPRING CLEAN UP

The annual spring clean-up will commence on the following dates: West end, Monday May 2 East end, Monday May 9.

YARD WASTE

- Branches and Brush in biodegradable bags or bundled and tied (less than 4" in diameter)
- Leaf and Yard Waste in biodegradable bags
- METAL- Pipes, Ductwork, etc. Propane Tanks (VALVE OPEN) Metal Appliances
- ELECTRONIC WASTE
- Items must be placed at the curb by 7:00 AM on the scheduled collection start date (listed above for each end of Town).
- Items may be set out as early as one week in advance of the scheduled collection start
- Please place material on the shoulder of the road or back lane next to your driveway.
- Only one (1) pass will be made for each street, please ensure your items are out ahead of the scheduled start date.

ITEMS THAT <u>WILL NOT</u> BE PICKED UP INCLUDE:

Household garbage, recyclable materials, cardboard, construction and demolition material of any kind, furniture, mattresses and box springs, carpets, large tree limbs/trunks/stumps, plastic toys, tires or household hazardous waste (HHHW) such as motor oil, gasoline, paint cans, batteries, antifreeze, etc., and any other items not listed in the accepted items list.
