Floods

- What you can do:
Before a flood - Be prepared for an emergency by creating a 72-hour emergency preparedness plan and kit for you and your family.
Inside your home: • store any personal belongings in sealed bins
• move documents and keepsakes out of the basement
• test sump pumps regularly and install a back-up system (for example, battery back-up or generator)
• put weather protection sealant around basement windows and ground-level doors
• install check valves in sewer traps to prevent floodwater from backing up into the drains of your home
Outside your home: • extend downspouts at least 2 metres from your home to move water away from the building
• remove debris that could present danger during flood events
• secure outdoor furniture and items around piers, docks or boathouses
• regularly maintain water drainage systems, such as weeping tile, culverts and ditches

Hydrant Flushing Notice

Please be advised that hydrant flushing will commence in the Town of Deep River beginning on Monday April 11th, 2022. Flushing will run until Friday May 20th, 2022, but may be extended due to unforeseeable circumstances, please check the NRT and Town website for any changes to these dates.
Flushing is part of a routine maintenance program that is necessary to maintain the integrity of the water system, remove sediment from water mains, verify the proper operation of hydrants and valves, and maintain firefighting capability.
Residents throughout Town may experience a drop in water pressure and water may be rusty or cloudy due to flushing of the distribution system. If you have rust-coloured water please run your COLD WATER TAPS ONLY (suggested taps: outside hose, bathtub or laundry tub) until the water is clear.
Please DO NOT use your hot water until you have clean running water again.

Feeding Deer

If you see a deer near your home or on the roads, don't feed it. That's the message from the Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry, who says many cars hit deer because the animals are crossing the roads to get to feeders.
When deer gather around an artificial feeder it makes them a target for wolves and coyotes, and giving them the wrong food can make them sick.
The Ministry also notes they have metabolisms designed to store fat for the fall and winter, allowing them to survive with less food.

Distracted Driving

- All vehicles (including bicycles) must follow the rules of the road at all times. A reminder that bicycles are vehicles and cyclists have the same rights and duties as motorists!
- It is very important that cyclists, pedestrians and motorists all be extra vigilant around school zones, intersections, crosswalks and public transit stops.
